THE LEGACY OF 1831, OUR CHALLENGE OF 2008

Last fall's new cedar siding and windows brought us a step closer to completing exterior preservation work on the Davenport House, with the help of board member and committee chair Buster Miller, the members of his committee, and the very generous donation of skilled labor and materials from Quad City Home Builders and their member organizations like McCarthy Construction and Ehrecke Construction. The results are worth your visit this spring, as are the beautiful historic gardens, adjacent prairie restoration, and new historic signage! Opening Day is Saturday, May 3.

During removal of the old siding on the south face of the home, we found a simple inscription "1831." It was chiseled into one of the substantial timbers of the building 177 years ago by a timberman preparing that log for transport and erection on the island in the Mississippi River.

That simple inscription on a single log spoke volumes to all of us. First, that this anonymous timberman was proud of his role in helping build what is today the oldest permanent residence in the Quad Cities. Second, that Col. George Davenport built solidly, not just a place of business, but a residence declaring his impressive accomplishments, and his intent to make a mark on the future of our area. He did much in his few remaining years.

As current stewards of this National Historic Landmark site, we owe it to ourselves and future generations to also build well and proudly, not just a structure, but a living tradition.

With this goal in mind, we are planning new interpretive programs beyond our very successful "lunch and learn" gatherings. We are also working with area educators to offer opportunities for promising young students to research the history surrounding not just the Davenport home, but our entire community. We are also hoping to secure support for new public programs, to include plays and musical activities intended to educate, while bringing new financial support to operations and endowment for tomorrow.

We welcome your continued support, whether as a visitor, member, interpreter, guide, or sutlery gift shop volunteer. We especially welcome our new board members, and hope you will join them in helping preserve and interpret the Colonel Davenport House for the future.

Under Construction: COL. DAVENPORT HOUSE RECEIVES SOUTH SIDE LIFT

On October 5, the siding was removed from the south side and many local media came to cover the event, including Susan McPeters from WQPT, Alma Gaul from the Quad-City Times, Reggie Jarrell from the Argus/Dispatch, WQAD, WHBF, and Fox 18.

This necessary work was done thanks to a grant from the Scott County Regional Authority. Along with the siding and window work being done by McCartney Construction and Ehrecke Construction, they also replaced the handicapped accessible ramps that go into the house and the sutlery gift shop. Dave McCartney provided wood from an 1890 Scott County barn to create the covered walkway between the main house and the sutlery.


